## A little bit of Turn Moss history

## Operational history 1918–19

Following the closure of the Trafford Park Aerodrome (Manchester) in 1918 after only seven years of spasmodic use, Alexandra Park Aerodrome was constructed and opened in May 1918 by the War Department for the assembly, test flying and delivery of aeroplanes for the Royal Air Force (RAF) built in the Manchester area by A. V. Roe & Company.

A Relief Landing Ground was designated at Turn Moss, one nautical mile to the west, in Stretford.



Thanks to Manchester City Council and their Neighbourhood Officer Pete, there is now a new directional Turn Moss sign on the Chorlton side of Edge Lane and also one at Ivy Green Road. Hopefully the ones from Trafford will not be long in making their appearance.

## **Stretford Grammar & RHS**



We were successful in gaining another RHS grant, "It's your neighbourhood, Britain in Bloom". We have been awarded support in the Greening Grey Britain 2019 campaign, which aims to help intergenerational groups to work in partnership, to transform grey spaces in their local communities into thriving neighbourhood spaces for people, planet and wildlife.

The RHS will provide hands-on support from a local member of their Community Outreach Team, a qualified horticulturist experienced in training and co-ordinating gardening activities with all ages. The RHS will also provide up to £500 worth of materials and plants to support the project.

During 15-18 July FoTM, Stretford Grammar and the RHS had a great planting session, creating the Cherry Orchard Garden at the top of Turn Moss Road. The pupils worked hard over the 4 days and were very creative. As well as planting they created a bug hotel for the "local residents". They also had to do presentations on their work. Two of the FoTM Committee were invited along to see their presentations which were very informative as well as being extremely entertaining.

The pupils from Stretford Grammar Gardening Club intend to manage this new "Cherry Tree Garden". Together we planted year-round colour, with fragrant,

pollinator-friendly shrubs & climbers to create a pleasant stopping point.

## **Tree News**



Autumn Cherry flowering in the R.H.S Stretford Grammar Cherry Tree Garden. During National Tree Week (23rd-1st December) Stretford Grammar, together with the Tree Council and the Friends, will be planting some fruit trees near the Hawthorn Lane car park. We have just heard that our request for trees from TCV and OVO Energy has been successful. As part of the 'I dig trees' initiative we are being supplied with 200 whips to complete the hedge restoration. From January onwards oak, alder, beech, birch, hornbeam, blackthorn, guelder rose, hawthorn, dogwood and goat willow will be added to the planting.

## Groundwork

We welcomed Groundwork and their corporate volunteers from Franke UK Ltd to Turn Moss fields in August. They worked along the Domesday hedge nr Sally's Pond Field, clearing the tall grasses away from the base of the young City of Trees whips we planted in the spring (to restore the hedge line). With the grasses cleared from around the base it gives the little new trees the best chance to survive. Next season they'll be strong enough to fend for themselves, all of them look very healthy.

Groundwork and Franke also did a Bioblitz. This helps us monitor the site and judge whether changes have improved the number and range of species on the site. The volunteers photographed and ID'd any species they found. The results really show the difference having wider margins and no-mow areas can bring, it improves the biodiversity but does not encroach on the pitches.

The team used the iSpot app, which is brilliant and very simple to use, upload a photo and the app suggests what species it may. In the first hour they had seen 3 frogs, 1 vole (not photographed!), damselfly, ladybird, beetle, green necked parakeet.
